Alfred Gross Memorial Lecture October 23

The third annual Alfred Gross Memorial Lecture will occur on Saturday, October 23. Our short Shabbat Service will start at 10am. Avram Lyon, past executive secretary of the National Jewish Labor Committee, will speak at 11am on "Jews in the Labor Movement, in the US and Eastern Europe." A Middle Eastern lunch by Nourish will be served at 12:30pm. Avram's afternoon talk will start at about 1:30pm.

Our guest scholar, Avram Lyon, is past Executive Secretary of the Jewish Labor Committee and has been active in the Jewish labor movement for many years. He worked in his family's chicken packing plant on the Eastern Shore of Maryland, then founded the North American Jewish Students Network, The Jewish Student Press Service and the North American Jewish Students Appeal. He helped develop the turkey industry in Israel in the 1960s. Since then, as a labor expert he has mediated,

consulted, served on boards, and written extensively about the Jewish labor movement. An excellent speaker, he will share inside information on some key Jewish contributions to the American labor movement.

President's Message

Each of us do make a difference in this world but it is up to us to decide what kind of difference we want to make. *T'shuva, T'fillah and Tz'dakah*—repentance, prayer and charity... this is how, we as Jews, can repair the world...the idea of *Tikkun Olam*.

The theme of Returning to God has been hanging over us for the last month—the call to turn inward, time to reflect. Why do Jews return to the synagogue in such large numbers on Yom Kippur? I am sure that memory, custom, and instinct play a large role in this large increase in attendance. Compared to the much smaller attendance during the year for Shabbat and festival services, why on Yom Kippur do we have this homing instinct to gather at the synagogue?

T'shuva, T'fillah, Tz'dakah.

Could it be the change in seasons—summer is over, the air is getting cooler, the leaves may have begun to fall. Could this signal us to our immortality? Do we become aware of our human frailty and seek out the safe place, a place for a tribal gathering of our people, to pray for reassurance of the upcoming year?

I, for one, enjoy, in fact long for, the communal experience of standing together, reading together, praying together... knowing that I may not have a personal link with everyone in synagogue but I am linked together with all of you by virtue of who I am. I am a daughter of Israel, I stand as a Jew among a Jews present, past and future.

As I sit in synagogue, there are times during the service that I will search through the Machzor for inspiration and guidance. For a special word or

phrase that will bring insight into my own spirituality.

T'shuva, T'fillah, Tz'dakah.

I can be kinder. I can be more forgiving. I can be more generous. I may not be able to live longer or be able to avoid my own suffering. I may not be able to avoid all the unpleasant situations or keep my children from harm but I believe in acts of compassion, deeds of loving kindness and acts of generosity. Through *T'shuva, T'fillah and Tz'dakah* I can make life more pleasant, sweeter and more meaningful for me and for others.

As the Jewish people, we have it ingrained within us to care not only for ourselves, not only for our partner, spouses, our families but for all of humankind. We truly are our brothers' keepers.

According to the Talmud, those of us who give generously to many causes must consider their own synagogues before giving to broader and more universal causes. We should learn to put *Tz'dakah* in our personal budgets. We need to ensure that Jewish education will continue, that there is a gathering place where Jews know they can come to for celebration, prayer, reflection, worship, learning... community.

Here we are in our 13th anniversary year at Seaside. I can remember back 11 years when we met for Shabbat services maybe 4 times a year, at irregular intervals and anywhere when someone would volunteer their home. We had a bag that contained some old siddurs, a pair of candle sticks and some kippas. We have grown in unbelievable terms within the last 11 years.

We have our own building, a Memorial Board, a new kitchen, a new Ark, our own Torah, six

classrooms, a Religious School from 1st grade through confirmation class. “I started thinking about incorporating another regular practice into my own life because I need to be more disciplined in my own practices. When I thought about it for myself, I wondered if others might be interested as well. I’ve been working on finding a regular time for prayer and meditation preferably in the morning so I can carry the peace that comes from those activities with me throughout the day. So I’m going to begin using Wednesday as my day, and I’m inviting anyone who also might like to spend an hour with a little prayer, maybe some meditation, perhaps some singing to join me. I’ll be at Seaside beginning Wednesday morning, October 6, from 9 to 10 and will continue to be there every Wednesday morning at least through November and see how it goes. For me setting up such a specific time becomes a way to remind myself of the changes I committed to make during these High Holy Days and to ask how I’m doing.”

Global Day of Jewish Learning

Seaside will be joining with Jews throughout Delaware for the Global Day of Jewish Learning on November 7 in Wilmington, DE. SJC members will travel to the Wilmington Jewish Community Center to participate as part of the Delaware Jewish community for the first ever worldwide, trans-denominational and non-denominational event devoted to Jewish learning. The Delaware program will be among an expected 300 community programs and over 1000 house parties to take place on this day throughout the world. We will all be studying, exploring, and debating a single set of texts on seven topics from the Talmud. Topic areas include Environment, God, Love, Leadership, Miracles, Prayer, and Tzedakah.

The program begins with lunch at 12:30 and ends at 3:30. SJC will arrange car pools for those interested in participating. Our religious leader, Beth Cohen will be one of the teachers along with other Delaware clergy. We hope to have several car loads of folks from our end of the state. The Global Day of Jewish Learning celebrates the completion of Rabbi Adin Steinsaltz's audacious quest to translate the Talmud from the original Aramaic and ancient Hebrew into Modern Hebrew began in 1965 when he was 27 years old. He will complete his 45-volume translation and commentary during a ceremony in Jerusalem on November 7. In addition to the full Modern

Hebrew translation, he has translated parts of the Talmud into English, Spanish, French, and Russian.

The Global Day of Jewish Learning is a project of the Aleph Society in partnership with the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee, the Jewish Community Center Association, Jewish Education Service of North America, Jewish Federations of North America, Hillel: The Foundation for Jewish Campus Life, and the Shefa Institute. Supporting partners include the governing bodies, leadership, and ordaining institutions of the Reform, Conservative, and Orthodox movements of Judaism, as well as the leadership of the Reconstructionist Rabbinical Association.

Holocaust Museum Interfaith Trip

On November 16, the Progressive Interfaith Alliance (PIA) is sponsoring a bus trip to Washington, DC to visit the National Holocaust Museum. The trip includes a reserved tour of the permanent exhibit as well as the visiting exhibition on Nazi propaganda. The trip cost is \$40 which includes round trip transportation and a catered dinner with a guided discussion of the experience. Museum admission is free and lunch is on your own. The purpose of the trip is to promote mutual understanding and unity against all forms of genocide. The PIA, the trip's sponsor, is a group comprised of clergy leaders from faith communities in the Cape Henlopen region who come together for mutual support and spiritual enrichment. This open group includes SJC, Unitarian/

Why did the "Golden Age" of Spanish Jewry end? What was the motivation of the converts, the true intentions of the Inquisition, and where did the Jews migrate after the expulsion, and why? Come and learn about where some of your ancestors came from, and why.

Stay Tuned for "A Moveable Feast!"

The SJC Adult Education Committee is presenting its 2011 Adult Educational Program called "A Moveable Feast!" Each course or discussion will take place on Thursdays at 7:30 PM at the SJC building.

First Thursdays – The Jewish History class will continue, moderated by Burt Brenman. Each session covers a new topic. We view and then discuss a 30-minute DVD prepared by professors at Hebrew University and other universities. Kindness, Honor. These make up who we are and who we would like to be. We will explore our understanding of their meanings and what our tradition teaches about each of them.
